



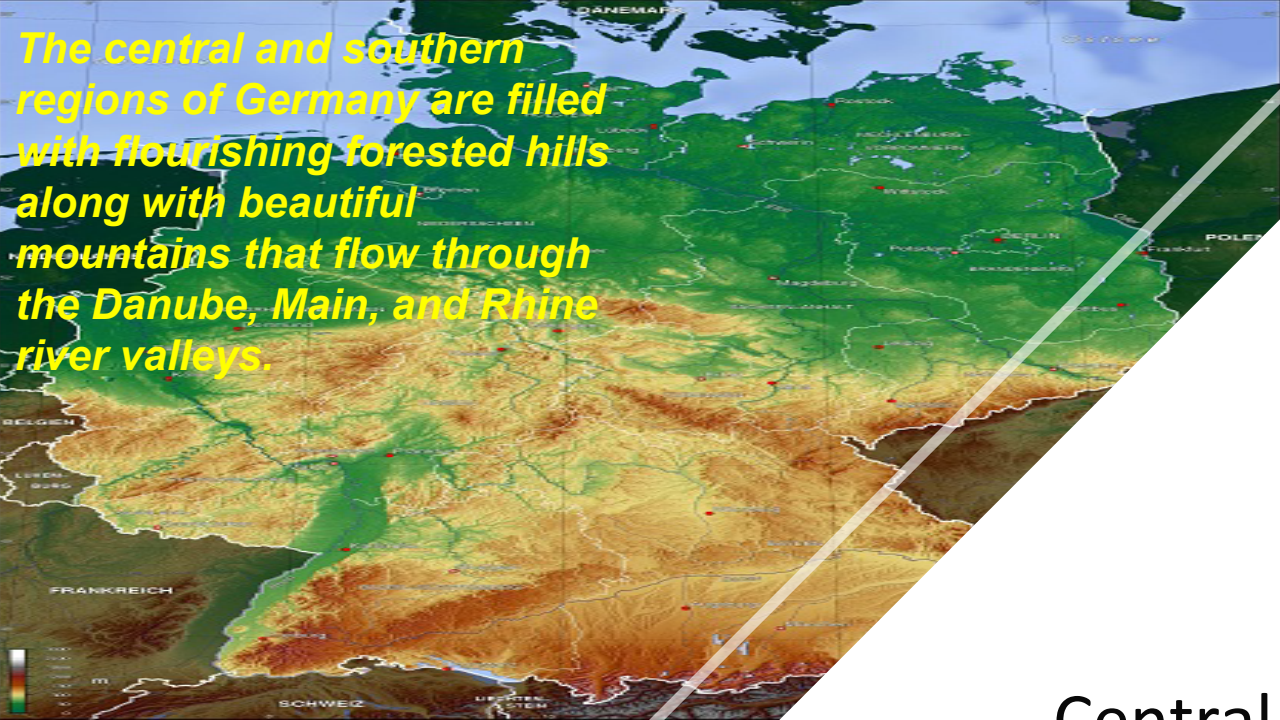

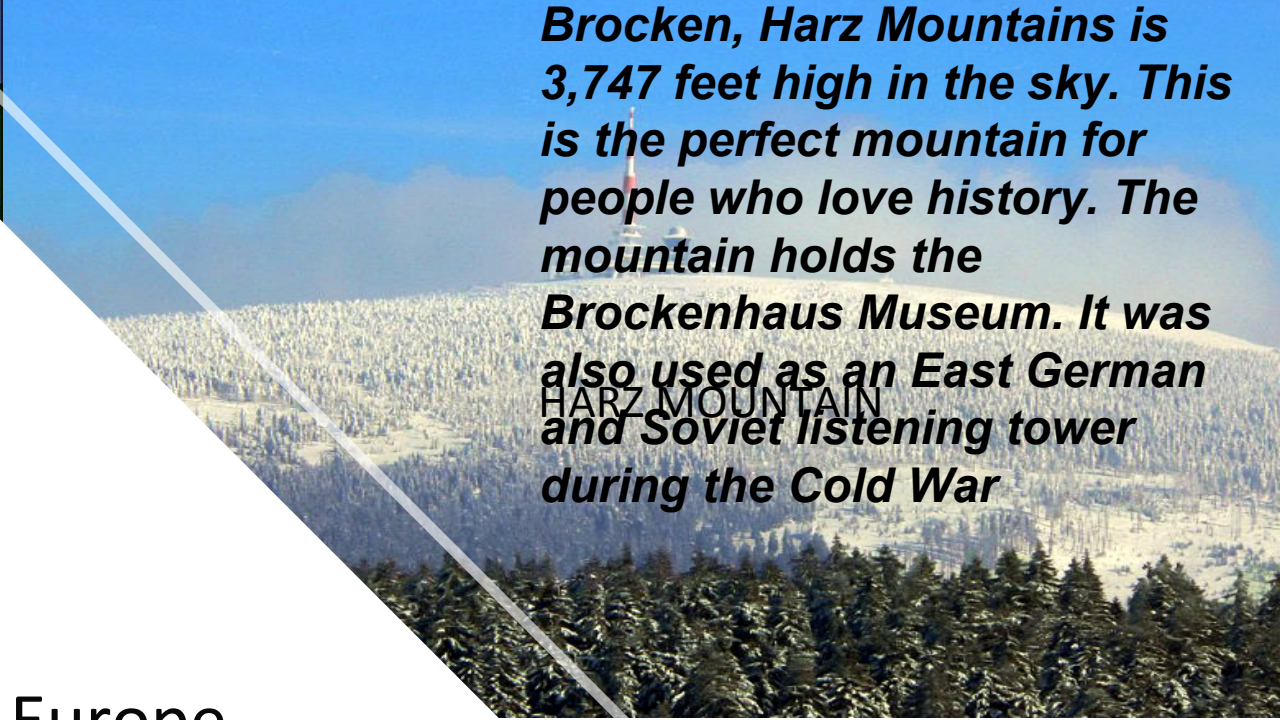
Partial part of the

History

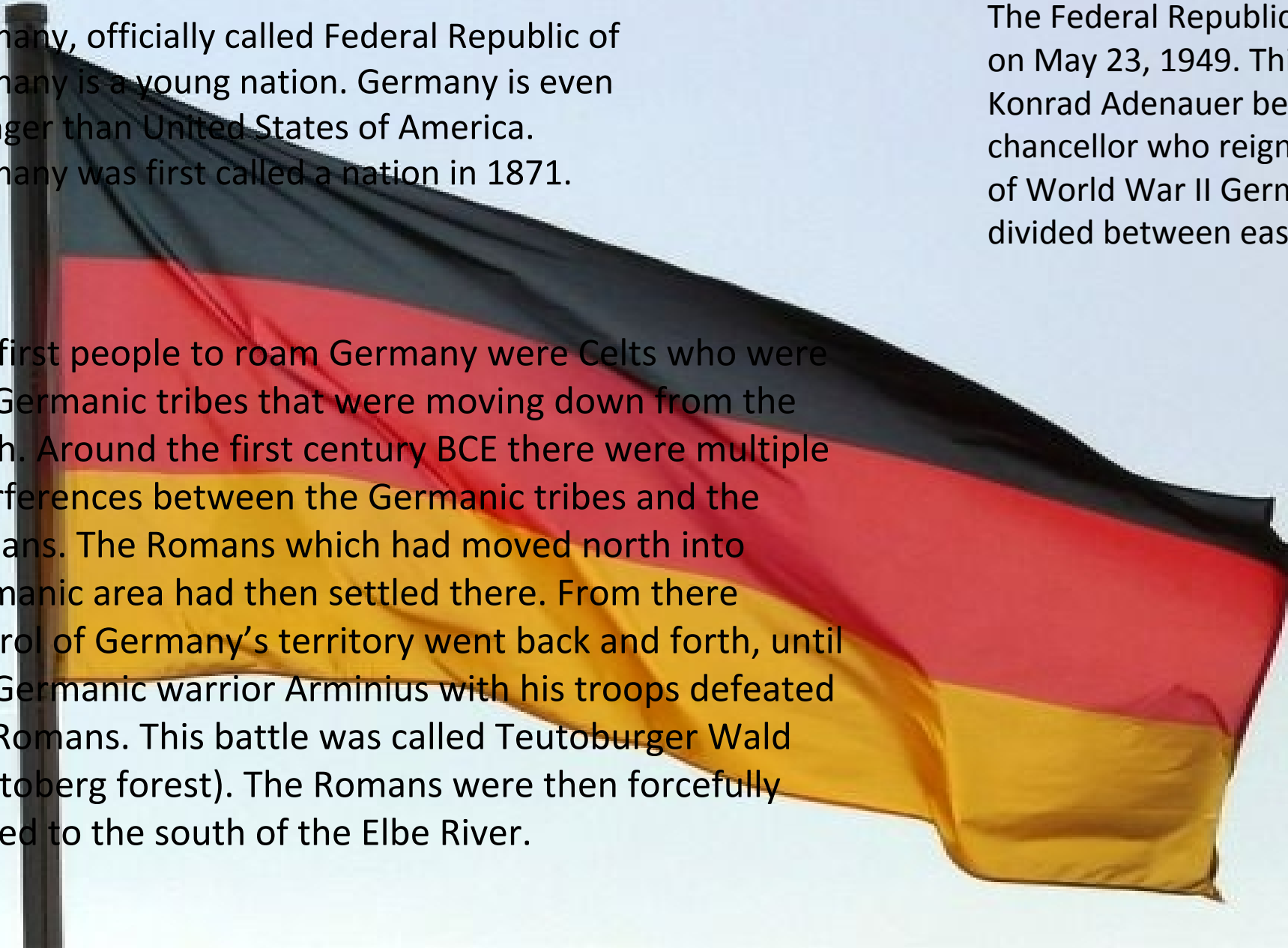

The Federal Republic of Germany was established on May 23, 1949. This is also the time that Konrad Adenauer became the nation's first chancellor who reigned for 14 years. As a result of World War II Germany was divided. It was divided between eastern and western halves.

The first people to roam Germany were Celts who were the Germanic tribes that were moving down from the north. Around the first century BCE there were multiple interferences between the Germanic tribes and the Romans. The Romans which had moved north into Germanic area had then settled there. From there control of Germany's territory went back and forth, until the Germanic warrior Arminius with his troops defeated the Romans. This battle was called Teutoburger Wald (Teutoburg forest). The Romans were then forcefully moved to the south of the Elbe River.



Food


German food is full of breads, potatoes, meat, pork, greens, cake, coffee, and beer
