

# Physical Geography & Location

- Located midway between Senegal & Cameroon, bordered by Togo & Ivory Coast
- · Rivers/Lakes- Ghana is home to the world's largest artificial lake, Lake Volta
- Climate- Ghana's climate is warm and humid with alterations between rainy summers and dry winters
- Forested Plateau- Kwahu Plateau is an uplifted basin that extends for 160 miles (260 km) around Lake Volta
- Natural Resources- Such as Gold, Bauxite, Manganese etc, contribute to making Ghana one of the wealthier nations in West Africa.





### History

- Ghana was formerly known as the Gold Coast due to the large supply of gold.
- The large supply of gold then led to the colonization of Ghana in 1874
- Was the first Sub-Saharan African country to gain independence, on March 6 1957
- Kwame Nkrumah remains not only the first President of Ghana but the leader of non-violent protests and strike to help gain Ghana's independence
- Between 700 and 16000 Ghana was one of the three heat empires in West Africa alongside Mali and Songhai.






#### Culture
